

Brother Denis Ivan Hernon (20/10/36 – 10/7/13)

• Brother Denis was the youngest of the five children born to **Charles and May Hernon**. He was raised at Stones Corner and began school at St Joseph's Coorparoo and then went on to St Joseph's College, Gregory Terrace.

He joined the Christian Brothers in 1952 and started teaching in Ingham, North Queensland in 1957. His ministry took him to many Colleges over the following years such as St Laurence's, Maryborough, Yeppoon, Canberra, Dalby, Charters Towers, St James, St Mary's Toowoomba (1977 and 1978), Balmain and Ignatius Park (Townsville). In 1982 he was called to be the Vocations Director for the Christian Brothers in Queensland.

He was an extraordinary man who reached out to many people when he saw a need and shared his gifts with all. He was a person of the people and for all people. His life was full of colour, music, creativity, laughter and, very importantly, it was lived in the gospel message.

His own family were important to him – sisters **Maureen** and **Mel** and his brothers, **Leo** (also a Christian Brother) and **Fr Ivan**. He loved his time with the family for holidays or a family celebration and especially watching State of Origin or Bronco's games. His extended family of past students and families from the schools were also important to him. He reached out to everyone.

Brother Denis entered Eternal Life on 10 July 2013 and was buried at the Nudgee Cemetery after a Concelebrated Mass of Resurrection offered by his brother, Fr Ivan Hernon, Frs Tyrone Deere and Rex Woolnough. Brother Damien Price delivered the Eulogy.





Barry Edmund Lysaght (11/7/43 – 28/7/13)

Barry was born in Warwick, the second child of Bill and Dominica Lysaght. His siblings were John (RIP), Paul, Doug, Margaret (Kee), Bill and Gavin. Barry grew up in Toowoomba



attending the Holy Name Convent and then St Mary's Christian Brothers College. He retained his connection with former classmates in the 1951 – 1960 Group like **Paul Collins, Paul Reynolds, Geoff Brown** and **Kev Corcoran**, all his life.

His biggest win was courting and marrying **Ann** (**Stapleton**). They were blessed with five children **Jan**, **Steven**, **Pamela**, **Ben and Bronwyn** and faced life's obstacles together, particularly the tragic loss of Ben, in September 1994, as he had given Barry so much joy with his efforts on the football field. Some of Ben's Cronulla team mates remain family friends to this day.

Barry commenced work as a Clerk in the Railway Department and then followed a career as a Cost Clerk with the Main Roads Department and later the Albert Shire Council. The couple's first home was in Quelch St, Rockville before moving to Smith St, Southport in 1975.

Although their Smith St home had a pool, Barry loved the beach and took the boys and sometimes the girls to Main Beach for a 'dive in the saltwater' before school followed by a bakery stop on the way home. Sundays saw the family board the Nissan Urvan for Mass with the inspiration being an ice cream later, as Barry's treat.

In 1998 Ann, Barry, Steven, Ben and Bronwyn relocated to Perth and so began the adventures and misadventures at their BP Service Station in Church Avenue. It was hard work for the 'team'; but a good business and Barry loved it as it was a family business. Steven was voted the best worker, because he charmed everyone who came through the door and this time really cemented the bond between the inseparable pair — Barry and Steven, they were best mates, but Ben's sudden death prompted a move back to Toowoomba and Kearney St.

Barry and Ann loved travel and they truly embraced and enjoyed the beauty of the country, they were experts at camping as family holidays always involved camping and swimming. There was a convoy trip across to Perth and a 3½ months trip around Australia just to name a few of their adventures. They loved friends dropping in, their doors were always open to welcome you with a cold one or a cuppa.

Racing and betting played a big part in Barry's life and he and Steven enjoyed the time spent each Saturday researching form and placing their bets. Barry's mathematical prowess and love of racing saw him pencilling for Bookmaker, Henry Smith for a time.

On Thursday 11 July, Barry celebrated his 70th birthday, surrounded by his family and friends. As he hoped and prayed to Saint Mary MacKillop, he wanted to have a quality life and when the time was to come, he wanted it to be fast. Obviously his prayers were answered as he passed away peacefully with Ann by his side on 28/7/2013, only two weeks after going into hospital. Barry had fought a good fight with courage over the past few years as he faced his battle with cancer and in the later stages of his illness, had received a surprise visit from his nephew, **Andrew Blomeley**, who came across from America.

His good friend, **Fr John Quinlan**, offered the Requiem Mass at Our Lady of Lourdes, Newtown, in Thanksgiving for Barry's Life, on 2/8/13.

 Three women who played significant roles in the support of the Christian Brothers and the College have passed to Eternal Life since our last Newsletter:

<u>Pauline Alroe</u> passed away peacefully on 23/6/13, aged 89 years. She was the wife of the late **Jack Alroe** (RIP 15/4/2010), a popular Toowoomba dentist and a Past President of our Association and the College Parents and Friends Association.

When the Wells Scheme was introduced into Parishes in the early 1960s Fund Raisings, apart from our Annual Ball were not permitted in order to free parents to contribute to their Parish Scheme. Some parents and the College administrative staff realised that the Brothers' upkeep and College maintenance simply could not function without help. After much diplomatic manoeuvring Mesdames Pauline Alroe and Gwen Betros obtained permission to have a 'Hoy Party Luncheon' – akin to housie, and the function was a great success financially and socially.

Pauline spent 18 years as an alderman of the Toowoomba City Council and was the only woman representative for many years and set an example which **Sue Englart** (O'Connor) and Regina Albion (Plant) followed, always championing the new City Library and the City's Parks and Gardens. Four of her sons, **Michael, Damien, Christopher** and **Simon** attended St Mary's College and daughter **Philipa** is a current member of the College Staff.

After a Requiem Mass to Celebrate Pauline's life held in the Lourdes Home Chapel, her interment followed at the Drayton and Toowoomba Cemetery.



Margaret Mary Denzin was the wife of late Leo Denzin (Life Member No. 45) who was Dux of the College in his Senior Year (1940). Margaret who was the sister of Joyce (Inwood), Mary (Lester) and the late Patricia (Sedl) and Ron Smith, passed away on 13/8/13. She is survived by son John (who attended St Mary's in the 1950s), daughter Anne-Maree, Roslyn and Marita and their families.

<u>Lillian (Outen) Lynch</u> who turned 101 on 24/7/2013 was born in Charleville and married a local lad, **Matt Lynch**. The couple later settled in Toowoomba where Matt established himself as a popular local barber and they both actively supported the Brothers and the College when their 3 lads enrolled. Lillian was always to the fore assisting at the Tuckshop and on the Ladies Auxiliary Committee, helping at Balls, Fetes and Sporting events.

The family were keen supporters of students at Athletic Carnivals, with Lillian always concerned that Matt could get too excited when the finishes were close. As a young woman she was a good Netball and Tennis player; but her favourite recreation was fishing — for yellow belly, something she learnt in her early days fishing on the banks of the Warrego River at Charleville.

Lillian is survived by sons, **Neil** who cared for her in her later years, **Allan** and daughter **Julie** (**Junkiewicz**). **Ray** her eldest son predeceased her in January 2011. A large congregation gathered in St Patrick's Cathedral on the Feast of the Assumption, 15/8/13, to Celebrate Lillian's Life.

Francis Mead -26/5/19 - 25/6/2013

Frank was born to William & Elizabeth Mead on 26th
May 1919 in Toowoomba. His early childhood was spent
with his Dad opening railway stations along the Gore
Highway, between Toowoomba and Goondiwindi, while
his mother raised goats, chooks and sheep while caring for
a very hard working husband.

The family returned to Toowoomba where Frank attended St Mary's College in 1928 and 1929, coming under the influence of **Rev Brother J P Lacey.** The Meads then relocated to Dalby where he attended the Convent School giving him the opportunity to learn music which he was to enjoy throughout his life. Between 1933 and 1935 he was enrolled at Downlands College, passing his sub-junior and junior, before gaining a position with the Queensland National Bank in Dalby. He took an active interest in the Theatre and Music, loved horse riding and once was caught speeding down the main street of Dalby on his push bike.

Frank was a member of the Citizens Military Force and played drums in the pipe band. Always a man of the Empire he enlisted in the Australian Army with his best mate when war broke out and trained at Redbank and Singleton, NSW.

He set off on what he and his Dalby mates believed was 'great adventure', celebrating his 21st birthday in Cape Town on their way to Scotland. They were stationed at Salisbury Plains and once on leave in London, they watched the 'best fireworks display' you could ever witness during the Blitz from the rooftop of the Savoy Hotel.

Then they were off again on a ship to the Middle East to be stationed at Gizrah near the pyramids, before embarking at Alexandria bound for Crete, only to be diverted to Tobruk where the Australian 29th Battalion earned the name 'Rats of Tobruk'. Repatriated from Tobruk, the troops spent Christmas 1941 in Aleppa, Syria, before heading back to Australia for rehabilitation and further training for their action at Milne Bay.

After four troop train trips, Cairns to Brisbane and back and three DC3 plane flights over the Owen Stanley Ranges he married Joan Gallagher, the lass he had met in Sydney when doing his early training at Singleton, on 6th June 1944. Post War the Meads settled in Toowoomba, before Frank purchased a property at Jimbour to grow wheat. In 1957 the family relocated to Sandgate where Frank worked for **Charles Hope**, Hills Hoists and finally at the Audit Office, GPO in Queen Street, until retirement in 1979. Sadly Joan passed away in 1987, but Frank enjoyed his main interests in life after retirement, his music, playing the violin and photography and two visits to China in 1996 and 1999.

Frank regularly attended our TBOBA gatherings at the Irish Club until March 2009 enjoying particular rapport with **Jack Fallon and Kevin Healy** who had seen action in PNG. He died at the Star Nursing Home in Beaudesert on 25 June 2013, aged 94 years and 1 month old and is survived by his daughter **Frances** (**Taylor**) and son **William.**





Brigadier Ian James Meibusch AM (Retired)

Ian was born on 8th January 1933 to **Margaret and Lou Meibusch**. Lou worked in the Post Office all his working

life, rising to be the Superintendent of Mails for South West Queensland. Margaret had been Deputy Matron of the Toowoomba General Hospital before her marriage.

A good sportsman, Lou had earned his Wallaby Cap No. 119 before World War II and then was a winger in



the Toowoomba Rugby League Team captained by his brother, **Bob,** a half back in 1919, 1920 and 1921 and was a member of the 1920 and 1922 Toowoomba Valley's R.L. premiership sides.

The Meibusch family had arrived in Brisbane in 1866, after walking from a village outside Potsdam, near Berlin, to Hamburg, the year before. The maternal and paternal parents of Margaret's family were Polish; but had come from West Prussia, not too far from Potsdam, and they, too, came through Brisbane, arriving over the course of the 1880's.

Lou and Margaret settled into their new home in Bridge St, Toowoomba, erected by Lou's brother Bill and Ian began his Primary Education at the Holy Angels' Convent School on the Range. In grade 4 he was enrolled at St Mary's College, meeting up with lifelong friends **Brian Gagen, John Mulheron, Brian Hodgen** and others. He enjoyed participating in interschool sports, mostly Rugby and Cricket.

It was the later years of World War II and with the company of these lads, he rode his bike across town to the College and enjoyed mucking around the Range escarpment and the Toowoomba Quarry on weekends. On one occasion **Brian Gagen** and Ian rode their bikes the 50 miles out to **Uncle Jack Meibusch's** at Dalby, returning the next day. Fortunately there were no westerly winds blowing on the outward journey. On Saturdays he attended the movie matinee at the Strand picture theatre, rather than the Empire theatre where the other tribe of his class went.

Ian contracted osteomyelitis and his recovery was enhanced with the availability of the new wonder drug penicillin and the nursing care of his mother. He had to defer playing Rugby and took up tennis and became a valued member of the College Athletic Squad, as some of his father's pace became evident. Returning to Rugby in his Sub-Senior and Senior years he joined **Des Purcell** as the second breakaway in the First XV and it is recorded

how they were both always in the 'thick of things' during matches. Ian was also the wicket keeper in the First XI Cricket squad.

It was in the College Cadet Corps that Ian Meibusch excelled. The Federal Government had introduced compulsory military training in 1950 with the advantage for a member of a cadet unit being that his period of training would be shorter after leaving school. That year the College Cadet Company was divided into four platoons under 2IC Cdt-Lieut Ian Meibusch, assisted by Cdt Lieuts John Mulheron, Neil Purcell, Kev McErlean and Kev Everding. Ian did a remarkably efficient job and frequently visiting instructors commented on how fortunate the College was to have such a leader.

Applications for Duntroon were called later in 1950 and Ian was selected for entry, after satisfying a Brisbane Specialist about his osteo recovery. He travelled by steam train from Toowoomba to Sydney on his way to Royal Military College in Canberra with **Brian Gagen** who was taking up his vocation to become a Missionary of the Sacred Heart (MSC) Priest at Douglas Park NSW. Ian was Cadet No. 1324 in the 1951 January intake.

Ian graduated in December 1954 into the Royal Australian Artillery and then completed a regional officers' gunnery course at the School of Artillery at North Head, undertaking the Air Defence element of the course. He was then posted to the National Service Training Battalion in Holsworthy and later as Adjudent, 24 Heavy Ack Ack Regiment, a CMF Unit in Western Australia and then in the same role with 3 Field Regiment, also in Western Australia.

On returning from the West in 1959 and after further regimental experience with 1 Field Regiment at Holsworthy, Ian was chosen to attend the 2½ year long Technical Staff Officers' Course at the Royal Military College of Science at Shirvenham in the United Kingdom, followed by a six month attachment to relevant British Army establishments.

Having completed the Course and with qualifications 'PTSC', Ian's future career, as expected, was redirected towards the areas of military technical application and material support which was to benefit the Army and Defence during the rest of his service. His postings from the rank of Major to Brigadier all related to either manpower employment and training or technical and scientific development. Highlights were:

- Operational Research with the Office of the Scientific Adviser to the Military Board
- Field Operational Research at HQ Australian Forces, Vietnam, including post operational research carried out after the battle of Long Tan



- Commander Australia Guided Weapons Trials Unit, Woomera
- Senior Technical Staff Officer, Washington DC
- Director Armaments and Electronic Materials
- Defence Science Representative Australia Defence Staff, London
- Director General, Army Quality Assurance
- Director General, Material Army

In 1979, while on the Staff in London, Ian was presented with the 'Order of Australia' by Her Majesty the Queen at Buckingham Palace. The citation reads, 'For professional ability and dedication to duty in the field of Acquisition at the national and international level'.

Ian retired from the Army in 1985 and worked for the Metal Trades Industries Association, running, as part of his work, the Australian Aerospace Industries Association, and also having a key role in the Defence Manufacturers Council. Running the Aerospace Association took him, most years to Air Shows overseas. In 1987 Ian and his wife **Helen** attended the Paris Air Show and afterwards visited the Holy Land and Egypt. The Aerospace work was something he took with him when he moved to aircraft manufacturer, Hawker de Havilland, to run their Canberra office, until he retired in 1998. As a Life Member of our Toowoomba Brothers Old Boys' Association, he kept in close contact with the College and former classmates, Brian Gagen and John Mulheron. In 1998 Ian was the Guest of Honour at the St Mary's Graduation Ball, a fitting return to his 'Alma Mater' as he had been presented with the College 'Character and Leadership' Award in his Senior Year, 1950. Twelve months ago he was amongst the guests at the College for the Awards Ceremony on 26/7/12, as part of Catholic Education Week in Toowoomba when 3 students received their prestigious Defence Force Technical Scholarships.

In 2010, accompanied by his son, **Chris**, he revisited Perth where his grand-daughters were playing hockey for their Universities in the Australian University Games there, giving Ian the opportunity to catch up with a couple of National Service mates from his old CMF unit at the local Bowls Club. Well, when he entered the room it was packed with over 100 ex National Servicemen all in their 70s or 80s and there is an announcement from the M.C. over the public address system.

'Gentlemen, please be upstanding for our Guest of Honour, our adjutant from 1955. It has taken him over 50 years to make it back; but please welcome back to the West, Captain **now** Brigadier (retired) Ian Meibusch AM.'

Son, Chris, was stunned; but Ian didn't blink an eyelid and worked the room for 3 hours.

Ian had met his future wife, **Helen (Loof)** at a Duntroon recreational dance and later, when she was nursing at the Royal North Shore Hospital while he was at the gunnery course at the School of Artillery at North Head. They married in 1955 just as Ian was posted to Perth where their sons, Peter and Chris, were born. By the time they returned to Canberra in 1963 they had lived in 18 houses,

But they were exciting years – Ian and Helen saw the world, with postings beyond familiar places, to Perth, Western Australia, England (twice), Woomera, the United States and for Ian, shorter periods in Far North Queensland, Papua New Guinea, with US forces in Hawaii and also two tours to Vietnam.

In retirement Ian devoted himself completely to Helen who had not been well, for quite a few years, while he had some serious health challenges emerging for himself. Helen passed away in 2010 and Ian, after a long battle with lung cancer on 12/7/13. He is survived by **Peter and Margaret, Chris and Janet,** 3 grandsons and 2 granddaughters and sister **Barbara**. His brother **Noel** predeceased him. Ian's full and generous life was one of commitment and hard work with a high value placed on his friendships, whether they be extended family or his mates from St Mary's or Army colleagues.
